- Most important part of research!
- Keep an online document as you research with the website

link and any quotes or images you use from that page.

- Even if you paraphrase, keep the original quote and source.
- Use an app or add-on to create a works cited at the end.








Advanced Searching

- Use the Tools button to refine your search to sites from the last 2-5 years
- Add "site:" to look for results from specific domains, such as "site:.edu" for universities,

"site:.gov" for government institutions, or

"site:www.nyt.com" as an example for a

specific website.





Warning Signs

- No absolutes. Sometimes scientists are still working on definitive conclusions, like with radio radiation.
- Look for references on the website. Is their info based on scientific research from universities or government?
- Lookout for opinion pieces within typically reliable sites, such as newspapers or government agencies.
- The more ads on a website, the less likely it is reliable. If they are selling a product, you are watching an ad!
